The admission standards are set by the <u>Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education</u> and are revised annually if needed.

(1) Additional weighting (1.0) will be added to the GPAs of students who take the College Board Advanced Placement (AP) courses and higher level International Baccalaureate (IB) courses.

(2) Students meeting the following requirements under each admission option will be placed on a waiting list and evaluated according to stated policy: Option 1: students with the required ACT score but less than a 3.0 GPA and lower than the top 50 percent of the high school class; Option 2: students in the top 26-30 percent of their high school class with at least a 3.0 GPA; and Option 3: all students.

(3) Cognitive: Noted academic standards; quality, quantity and level of coursework throughout the entire high school program; completion of a progressively challenging math sequence, demonstrated by performance; and class rank taken in context with academic rigor and class size of high school attended. Non-Cognitive; Students must demonstrate strengths in non-cognitive factors such as positive self concept, realistic self-appraisal, long-term goals, leadership experience, community, and knowledge in an acquired field.
